2019 FALL MIXER: EQUITABLE ACCESS TO MOBILITY

On October 30, HUP hosted the 2019 Fall Mixer in partnership with Hennepin County, the University of Minnesota, and MnDOT, on the theme of "Equitable Access to Mobility." The event was held in the Research Collaboration Studio at the University of Minnesota's Wilson Library. 46 participants from Hennepin County, the University of Minnesota, and other agencies gathered to share perspectives and explore potential partnerships around increasing equitable access to mobility.

Opening remarks were given by Jennifer DeCubellis, Deputy County Administrator for Health and Human Services; Carla Stueve, Director of Hennepin County Transportation Project Delivery; Katie Walker, Director of Research and Innovation at MnDOT; and Susan Jepson, co-founder of Upstream Innovations and Hitch Health. Professor Andrew Owen, Director of the UMN Accessibility Observatory, offered closing remarks.

Investigators are meeting regularly, and the project is expected to be completed in summer of 2020.

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SUMMER LEADERSHIP EVENT

On August 1, more than 50 leaders from the University of Minnesota and Hennepin County convened to explore opportunities to address community challenges together. Hennepin County Commissioner Jan Callison and Vice Provost and Dean of Undergraduate Studies Robert McMaster offered opening remarks, followed by seven recent HUP project teams presenting their work. These projects spanned multiple lines of business and academic concentrations, from aquatic invasive species to Youth Participatory Action Research. Attendees discussed the projects in small groups to foster future collaboration. David Hough, Hennepin County Administrator, spoke about the County's disparity reduction efforts, and three HUP Cohort members, Erik Erickson, Patrick Chelmo, and Alison Bong, shared several issues that would benefit from future collaboration. Executive Vice President and Provost Karen Hanson concluded the event by congratulating the flourishing partnership and urging ongoing support for this unique connection between academia and county government.

BROWN BAG SERIES ON HEALTH EQUITY

HUP hosts Brown Bag presentations at the Hennepin County Government Center as opportunities for Hennepin County employees to hear from key University researchers. In Spring 2019, the Brown Bag presentations focused on the theme of "Health Equity." The series was very well received and offered opportunities for County employees to consider the impact of health disparities on their work.

COLLABORATION PROJECT SPOTLIGHT

DETERMINING ALIGNMENT OF PROBATION CONDITIONS

This study, a previous recipient of Mixer grant funds, was a collaboration between Kelly Mitchell of the Robina Institute of Criminal Law and Criminal Justice and Danette Buskovick of the Department of Community Corrections and Rehabilitation. They explored the relationship between pre-sentence risk assessments and the conditions of probation to determine how well the risk and needs of offenders align with probation conditions, whether the timing of assessment impacts this alignment, and if outcomes improved when conditions are aligned with risk and needs.

Based on their findings, the team provided recommendations for how to set probation conditions that are aligned with reduced recidivism, like refining the content of pre-sentence investigation reports and collaborating with the court to identify other ways to address the needs of people on probation.



MORE PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

Hennepin County's Health and Human Services partnered with the College of Education and Human

Development to work with families on increasing screening and referral rates for young children.

Child Protection Services
UMN's Center for Advanced
Studies in Child Welfare worked
with Hennepin County's Child Well-Being
Unit to identify factors associated with
maltreatment recurrence and foster care
re-entry and to tailor services in order to
reduce rates.

Website Usability
Students in the Department
of Writing Studies conducted
usability tests on the Hennepin County
Attorney's Office website and recommended
changes to improve its ease of use.

As part of the Transitways Impacts
Research Program, managed
through the UMN Center for Transportation
Studies, Professor Yingling Fan researched

how riders plan their paths through the transit system and recommended ways for Hennepin County to increase ridership through improved pedestrian and bicycle systems.

Data-Sharing & Predictive Analytics

LEADERSHIP TEAM AND COHORT UPDATES

THE HUP LEADERSHIP TEAM provides oversight and guidance to the HUP program. This team is made up of six leaders from Hennepin County and six leaders from the University of Minnesota. Leadership Team members review proposals and select recipients of the Hennepin-University Collaboration Grant, as well as discuss and plan how to better cultivate collaborations between the University and Hennepin County.

In early 2020, **Lisa Cerney**, Assistant County Administrator for Public Works, joined this group.

THE HENNEPIN COUNTY COHORT

was created in 2011 to increase County line staff awareness of opportunities to partner with University of Minnesota faculty and staff. Members of the Cohort are liaisons within their departments and work to catalyze greater levels of connection in areas that benefit both Hennepin County and the University.

At the 2019 Cohort meetings, the following UMN faculty presented tools and resources of interest to County staff: Eva Keiser, Hubbard School of Journalism and Mass Communication, on strategic communications; Joseph Konstan, Raechelle Drakeford, College of Science & Engineering (CSE), on research opportunities with CSE; David Van Riper, Institute for Social Research & Data Innovation, on leveraging social statistics; Richmond Kinney, UMN Libraries, on using library resources.

LOOKING TO THE FUTURE OF THE HUP

In 2019, the Hennepin-University Partnership focused on supporting Hennepin County's efforts to reduce disparities, particularly around health and mobility domains. This meant tailoring our semi-annual Mixers and monthly brown bag events to bring together UMN faculty and students with Hennepin County staff working on public health and transportation issues. We were excited to have strong support from leaders from both partners who were actively engaged in setting the direction for these catalytic events, and in selecting and funding substantial research projects that are expected to shed light on ways to address disparities.

Looking ahead, we are working to find new opportunities to engage University researchers, students, and staff in collaborative work with County staff. Our new membership in the MetroLab Network, an international network of government-university partnerships focused on civic research and innovation, has connected us with peers engaged in similar work. We appreciate the support from both the UMN and County Administration that has made this new connection possible. As we share learnings and showcase our unique model, HUP is poised to further catalyze connections of value to the County and the University.


